

Lieutenant Commander Mark Swain Short, United States Navy Retired 2003 ABMALiving Legend


Why should this nominee be selected as ABMA Living Legend?

LCDR Mark Swain Short's military record was an enviable one that was and remains worthy of emulation. His record clearly speaks for itself and the Aviation Boatswain's Mates community. As a young man of 18, joining, the Navy, his Basic training in San Diego, CA, his first aircraft carrier the USS Boxer CV-21 working in catabults and arresting gear. making cruises to Korea, then shore duty at Catapult & Arresting Gear Test Site, Patuxent River Maryland, then back to the USS Midway CVA-41 as a Chief Petty Officer working again in Catapults & Arresting Gear. Then in the 60's working as the Hanger Deck Chief on the USS Shangri La CVA-38. The USS Ranger CVA-61 was next with a cruise to Viet Nam. Upon making Ensign, he was assigned to the USS Enterprise CVAN-65 as the Crash & Salvage Officer, with cruises to VietNam. Tour at Cherry Point Marine Base in North Carolina



as the Water Salvage Officer, the Catapult & Arresting Gear Maintenance Officer, making Med an Viet Nam cruises. The tour at the Schools Commands and being the Flight Deck Officer on the USS Lexington CVT-16, at Pensacola, FL and finally his last tour of duty at Sherman Field as the Crash & Salvage and Runway Support Officer.

LCDR Mark Short is a true ABMA "Living Legend" one that we should never forget. Looking over his career, and the careers of our already selected Living and Posthumous Legends, them taking numerous "greenie's" still wet behind the ears and turning them into professional, dedicated sailors and Aviation Boatwain's Mates. Our personal heroes, which have made our way as sailors and Aviation Boatswain's Mates much easier.







From The Historian

The subject of who the first AB was is of interest to many AB's. The navy had many aircraft carriers, blimps, seaplane squadrons, and naval air stations, the Naval Aircraft Factory at Philadelphia in commission in 1944 when the first AB's were officially designated. That means that there were many thousands of them. Almost all of these men had been doing the job before becoming the first AB's.

I have personally seen the certificate that AB1 Bud Snyder has, which proves that he became an AB1 in 1944. It is my guess that at least one of these first AB's kept a souvenir copy of the list with his and every other AB at his pay grade names on it. A copy of the official listings of the first AB Warrant Officers and Limited Duty Officers is also of much interest.

because I was getting close to mandatory retirement. Finally, the rank was approved thanks to the leaders of the mighty Navy LDO/CWO community who continued

to fight because they knew that CWO5 is indeed a GREAT thing for the Navy,

and to all of them I am truly grateful.

The Aviation Boatswain's Mate Insignia

Our insignia, bearing crossed anchors with wings, has stood for gallantry, productivity and dedication for nearly fifty years. Many excellent AB's have given their limbs and in too many cases their lives, performing the feats of the flight deck. Allow me to break the insignia down and put it into the right perspective for you.

The anchor is a heavy device used to secure a sea-going vessel or boat to a specific spot in a body of water. A single well-trained AB is an anchor. They secure their watch stations, whether it be securing aircraft on deck, fueling and defueling aircraft, directing aircraft around the deck, salvaging damaged aircraft, making aircraft settings on the arresting gear engine or hooking up and launching aircraft off our catapults.

Our insignia has two anchors. This signifies that we can't do our jobs alone. We must rely on each other and combine our knowledge and talents to fulfill our role on every flight and hanger deck. Just like a symphony orchestra in an amphitheater, we perform the marvelous spectacle of carrier air operations. We see

each other at our worst and our best and we assist each other through the rough and dangerous times that are always present. We teach each other, we test each other and though it is never stated, we love and respect each other deeply. Like the identical crossed anchors, our souls are bonded in friendship forever.

Then there are the wings. To put wings on a set of anchors in itself is superfluous. In retrospect, it would take very powerful wings and a strong back to support them in flight. AB's have the strong backs and the determination to get the job done no matter what the sacrifice. Unfortunately, those sacrifices are many and I would hope that they don't go unrewarded.

Remember the old fable about whenever a bell chimes, an angel gets its wings? Well, whenever you hear ship's bell sound, more AB's have sacrificed their time and used their professionalism to earn their wings. Our wings should signify that we have earned and secured our place in heaven.
